

## Colin I. Bradford, Jr.

Colin Bradford is a Non-Resident Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution where he is director of a project on reform of the G-7/G-8 summits with Brookings colleague, Johannes Linn, as part of the new Wolfensohn Initiative. His most recent papers are: “Global Governance in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century”, “The Political Agenda for Global Reform”, and “Global Health and Global Governance: Prioritizing Health within the Millennium Development Goals”, papers for the Centre for International Governance Innovation (CIGI) in Waterloo, Canada, and “Enhancing Macropolicy Choice: Prioritizing Growth”, presented to the G-24 deputies in the fall of 2004. He has edited nine books, and published forty articles, chapters and technical papers, as well as four monographs on development policy and international economic issues.

Prior to coming to Brookings, Dr. Bradford has had a long career in the U.S. government, international organizations, and academic institutions. From 1998 to 2004, he was research professor of economics and international relations and distinguished economist in residence at American University where he ran the interdisciplinary council on the global economy. From 1994 to 1998, Bradford was chief economist of the United States Agency for International Development where he served as a presidential appointee in the Clinton administration. In this capacity, he played a key role in initiating a set of international development goals agreed to by all donor countries which eventually became the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). In recent years he has been an adviser on the MDGs to the World Bank, the Inter-American Development Bank, and the Parliamentary Network on the World Bank, as well as to the Finnish Government.

Prior to joining USAID, Colin Bradford was head of research at the Development Centre of the Organization of Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) in Paris for four years where he organized annual conferences with the IDB on Latin American issues of importance to Europe. In the late 1980s, he was a senior member of the strategic planning division of the World Bank, while on leave from Yale University. At Yale for ten years, he was associate professor in the practice of international economics and management, associate director of the Yale Center for International and Area Studies, director of graduate studies in international relations, a member of the Yale Economic Growth Center and a research associate of the National Bureau of Economic Research.

During the 1970s, Dr. Bradford served in Washington for nine years in various capacities. He was a political appointee in the Carter administration where he served as director of the office of multilateral development banks in the U.S. Treasury Department, legislative assistant for economic policy and foreign affairs for U.S. Senator Lawton Chiles (D-Fla), a senior staff member of the Inter-American Committee on the Alliance for Progress (CIAP), and the first associate fellow of the Overseas Development Council.

Colin Bradford received his B.A. degree in history from Yale University and his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in economics from Columbia University.
